2019 SEMINARS

PROTECTING WINE COUNTRY FOR OVER 100 YEARS

DECEMBER 2018

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Over the past five years the Geyserville Fire Protection District (GFPD), to achieve improved fire prevention and emergency response, has attempted to annex adjacent unincorporated areas of Northeast Sonoma County that are not within another fire district. Though these efforts are supported by our neighboring fire departments, we have been unable to gain support from the County of Sonoma. We believe this is directly related to the fact that over a million dollars of property tax from Northeast Sonoma County allocated for fire and emergency services are utilized in other parts of the county. Geyserville Fire is committed to keeping this portion of local taxes earmarked for fire protection in our area. The Sonoma County Board of Supervisors is currently considering to implement a half-cent sales tax countywide to fund fire protection. Though we support the idea of sufficient and sustainable funding there is no guarantee that these funds will be utilized in Northeast Sonoma County. We are very concerned that our community based fire delivery model is in jeopardy if the GFPD is forced to make changes solely to obtain needed funding from the County of Sonoma. Our vision and plan is to work in cooperation with Healdsburg and Cloverdale fire departments to utilize funding from Northern Sonoma County to improve our level of service responding to emergencies and for prevention and preparedness.

The GFPD is moving forward with merging with the Knights Valley Volunteer Fire Company to better serve the Knights Valley and Franz Valley areas. We then plan to change our name to better reflect the large and geographically diverse area we serve.

COMMUNITY PREDAREDNESS

Preparing for the next emergency is a shared responsibility between each individual landowner, neighbors, community, and your public safety agencies. The Geyserville Fire Protection District believes what we do before the next emergency, in preparedness, is more important than what we do during or after the emergency. The October 2017 Sonoma County fires have made us realize that more preparation and collaboration among public safety agencies and citizens before an emergency can reduce the chaos, provide first responders with information to make decisions, and allow citizens to make decisions to reduce the loss of life and property. We continue to support neighbors organizing into groups to help one another and partnering with public safety agencies including the GFPD. We plan to host several preparedness seminars and presentations during 2019 to promote individual and community preparedness starting with a community preparedness meeting on January 19, 2019.

CITIZENS ORGANIZED FOR POTENTIAL EMERGENCIES (C.O.P.E.)

The GFPD has embraced the C.O.P.E. model for public safety agencies and citizens working together. C.O.P.E. is based upon neighbor helping neighbor. Our largest group, C.O.P.E. NE Geyserville, has formed east of the Russian River and north of Moody Lane. This group is lead by dedicated community leaders whom provide a direct connection between the GFPD and residents of the area. Smaller groups are also forming and we will do our best to help them move forward.
